
Trauma-Informed Youth Justice in Canada provides a comprehensive overview of youth justice in Canada and identifies trauma as one of the root causes of crime. Most young offenders have experienced some sort of trauma in their childhood; however, Canada's youth justice system punishes their criminal behaviour with little regard for this important context. In this volume, Judah Oudshoorn argues that a framework of trauma-informed youth justice is needed to understand youth offenses and recommends a model of intervention based upon prevention and healing.

After examining individual trauma, the collective trauma of patriarchy and colonization, and the trauma-inducing effects of the current youth justice system, this text describes the principles of trauma-informed youth justice and suggests a way forward that focuses on restorative justice, trauma-informed prevention, and victim-centred criminal justice.
