Now in its third edition, *Redefining Multicultural Education* argues that education programs have been historically and consistently unsuccessful in their attempts to create positive spaces for diverse student populations. Instead of celebrating diversity, classrooms have instead taught young people to view difference as deficiency. Ratna Ghosh and Mariusz Galczynski seek to change this as they persuade educators to view diversity positively and incorporate multiculturalism into their classroom pedagogy.
